For 104 years, Johnson College has been graduating students who work in technical fields creating, fixing and maintaining our communities. The College puts great emphasis on the quality of students it produces, but the success of our students can be directly attributed to the quality of our instructors - the men and women who made their mark on industry before pursuing careers in education. Currently, 23% of Johnson College employees are alumni, representing a long history of graduates who've returned to their alma mater to help shape the workforce of the future. From long standing programs in the building trades to more recent science division additions, our desire for alumni to return to campus to inspire our current students has remained constant.

Stephenie Vergnetti, Senior Director of Organizational Development, said there are significant advantages to hiring alumni for positions at the College. "For one," she said, "they are familiar with our culture. Alumni really know what our students need to succeed." She also cited advantages including knowledge of our campus and familiarity with industry partners who can provide jobs or internships to the students. "We have faculty who are not only alumni, but they have been here for decades," she said. "They're so great at what they do, they have students who come back to teach or work right beside them. I think that's what makes the alumni-employee relationship so special here." When doing assessments on employees, Ms. Vergnetti said her department has come to realize that the College is truly a family.

Among alumni employees are both faculty and staff. Kimberly Konopka, BC, CVT, '07, is the Program Director of Veterinary Technology, graduating from the College with her Associate of Science in Veterinary Technology in 2007. After spending nearly five years at the Wyoming Valley Veterinary Emergency & Hamlin Veterinary Clinic, her former teachers reached out to her and she could not pass up the opportunity to return to teach. She cites the strength of the program as one of the reasons she took the job and "one of the best moves" she has made in her career.

Similarly, Greg Race, '04, is an Academic Affairs Associate. Mr. Race was part of the third graduating class of the Computer Information Technology program. "I was a dislocated factory worker, and my counselor at the PA CareerLink office highly encouraged me to go back to school at Johnson College," he said. "As a student, I was offered a part-time position, not realizing that because of my focus and work ethic. I'd be offered a full-time job after graduation. It has been an amazing experience and I'm constantly learning."

There are many avenues for alumni to get back on campus. From guest speaking to tutoring to becoming a lab assistant, no gesture is too small when it comes to alumni putting their quality education to work. Johnson College thrives on the knowledge and experience that alumni bring to current students in the classroom.

The Villa Capri Cruisers Car Club, Inc. awarded \$1,000 to be given to a Johnson College Automotive Technology student. This is the fifth year for the scholarship by the club, which raises funds through donations, volunteer work, sponsorships, and annual calendar sales.

NATEF Training

The Automotive Technology Program at Johnson College hosted nine instructors to conduct a National Automotive Technicians Education Foundation (NATEF) Evaluation Team Leader (ETL) Training on October 18th. The day-long training prepared instructors to utilize accreditation standards to improve the quality of their programs.

Scholarship Breakfast

On November 9th, the College celebrated scholarship donors and recipients at a breakfast that is held annually at Fiorelli's in Peckville. More than 50 students received scholarships from 36 different funds and donors.

Veterans Day Activities

The Johnson College Student Engagement Department recognized student veterans in many ways this year. A lunch was held for student veterans, the Mobile Vet Center was on campus to provide services to student veterans, and the student group, Social Force, held a clothing drive for local veterans in need.

Ben Franklin Grant Collaboration

The College has completed an educational consulting project that was funded by Ben Franklin Technology Partners of NEPA and Pleasant Mount Welding. Each contributed \$20,000 to create an aluminum grating swaging machine, so Pleasant Mount Welding could begin manufacturing grates in-house as opposed to purchasing from a supplier. The grates contribute to the products the company provides to the wastewater and sewer industry. The overall goal of the project was to create a product that will create or sustain jobs in our area, while also sharing knowledge between industry and the College.

December Commencement

On December 16th, Johnson College held its second December Commencement Ceremony. Seventeen students from ten program areas graduated with Associate of Science or Associate of Applied Science degrees, or a program certificate. David F. Boniello, '84, Chair of the Board of Directors, delivered the keynote address.



















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
