Gabriel Martelli is no stranger to hard work. A graduate from North Pocono High School, he says he has always been a hard worker. In May 2019 he became an Eagle Scout after organizing a river clean up and restoring a portion of a walkway at Sweeney's Beach in Scranton. He said that completing this project was the "greatest moment of his life." It gave him a sense of accomplishment and leadership experience. This hard work transferred to his time at Johnson College.

While in shop class as a kid, Gabriel loved designing and building things. He was interested in going for engineering and was accepted to a different college, but when a representative from Johnson College visited his high school and he learned more about Johnson, it changed his mind. He saw Johnson College as the first stepping stone towards his career. At first, he was interested in both Electrical Engineering Technology (EET) and Advanced Manufacturing Technology (AMT). While participating in a Shadow Day for EET, he went down to the AMT lab and was amazed by the 3D printers and all the equipment. He did another Shadow Day for AMT and knew that was the right place for him.

The moments that stand out most to Gabriel are the ones with his teachers: Cole Goldstein, Rick Fornes '94, and Andy Zwanch '82. "They are truly great instructors," Gabriel said, "they communicated well. They knew how to help you and engage with their students in a way that kept them motivated and never left anyone behind." They built a classroom culture where the only thing a struggling student had to do was speak up and the faculty would be right there responding – especially during the pandemic.

Gabriel said that the transition to virtual was not easy at first. He felt that he and his fellow classmates struggled. He shared, "the biggest challenge was the implementation of taking a hands-on college, that a lot of people attend for that reason, and putting it on a virtual platform. It was a very bumpy road at first, but towards the end, it did get better and [faculty] did help a lot."

In addition to his faculty, Gabriel's favorite part of the program was the strong bond formed with his classmates. He said that coming to college and meeting great, quality people was an awesome experience. The two years went faster than he thought they would.

The best piece of advice Mr. Zwanch gave him was that life may throw a lot of curveballs at you, but you have to keep your head in the game. That advice kept Gabriel going academically through the pandemic.

Gabriel did his internship at Automated Lifestyles LLC, a home automation and networking company that integrates technology to create smart homes. "We can program your home so at the press of a button all your lights can turn on." By the time Gabriel graduated, he was offered a full-time position as a service technician. He services and installs all products placed into the homes before the clients can be trained on how to use them. His education at Johnson College, and the on the job training that he received during his internship, gave him a good foundation for the work he's doing now. "I love the job," Gabriel said, "I think it's the greatest job I've ever had." Besides seeing the most expensive car he has ever seen, he loves the job environment and it fills all the expectations he has had for a work environment.

The advice he would give to incoming students is that college is going to be different than what you expect. It's very different from high school. He also said, "Stay positive and just keep going. Keep working through it. You're going to be the best of the best because as Johnson says, 'we work.' As long as you work hard and put in the time you'll get what you give."
