COMMUNITY HUB LAUNCH

On November 15, the Special Programs department invited students and Johnson College employees to celebrate the launch of the new Community Hub. Located in the Moffat Student Center, the Hub will serve as a space where students can meet with College staff members or local agency representatives to discuss support services that are available to them within the community. Services include but are not limited to child care, transportation, housing, nutrition, utilities, employment, and social services. This one-stop shop is meant to alleviate the potential stressors of visiting multiple agencies.

ALUMNI & STUDENT CAREER FAIR

Johnson College students, alumni, and industry partners filled the Moffat Student Center and other spaces throughout campus to meet and discuss career opportunities at the College's most recent fall career fair. With over 250 student and alumni participants as well as over 70 regional employers in attendance, the event was the largest that it has been since 2020. Many of the students who participated in the career fair have since received internship or job opportunities.



Our Veterinary Nursing students attain hands-on, in-field opportunities with local veterinarians at small animal clinics through our internship and clinical lab programs; however, it's not often they gain firsthand experience in a specialty clinic.

Jamie Laubenstein '07, one of our Veterinary Nursing instructors, has spent countless years working alongside veterinary specialist Dr. Paul Mallonee. Outside of teaching, she expands upon her industry experience by assisting him. "Dr. Mallonee is an amazing supporter of veterinary nursing, Jamie said. "When he offered to allow our students to participate in equine anesthesia and surgery, we knew this would be a great opportunity for them to gain unique industry experience."

When Jamie presented this opportunity to her Surgical Rotation students during the fall semester, Kayla Ross and Cassidy Weber jumped at the chance to participate in this once-in-a-lifetime experience. "I've always been interested in large and small animal mixed practice," Kayla said. "I thought it would be a great opportunity to see how equine surgery is performed and what my role would be as a veterinary nurse if I decide to pursue that path."

Kayla and Cassidy traveled with Jamie to Kokinos Equine Services in Vernon, New York. Under the supervision of Jamie and equine veterinarians Dr. Mallonee and Dr. John Kokinos, the students helped prepare horses for castration and closure of an inguinal hernia.

As they dove headfirst into their roles, the students assisted in anesthesia induction and monitoring, intubation, inserting IV and arterial catheters for both fluid therapy and intravenous blood pressure monitoring, and much more. According to Cassidy, many of the steps they took were similar to the small animal surgery methods they learned during their on-campus classes and labs. Following the operations, they aided in the recovery process of the horses by monitoring their vitals and assessing for pain.

"We see cats and dogs under anesthesia quite often, but horses are a whole different story in terms of depth and vital norms," Kayla said. Both students appreciated the opportunity to expand their knowledge within their field of practice alongside industry professionals. "The surgery itself was incredible," Cassidy said. "It was also amazing to see my instructor, Ms. Jamie, being an anesthetist – she's a very skilled veterinary nurse."

"I think it's so important to offer opportunities like this to help students like me decide what we want to do with our future in veterinary medicine," Kayla said. With this industry experience under their belts, Kayla and Cassidy learned that their Johnson College education can lead them to many different career paths.
